

Maths

In Maths we explored area and perimeter and have recently moved onto fractions. Our assessments in the Spring term highlighted some areas that need a short re-visit and we have been focussing more recently on reasoning type questions and those that require subtraction. Presentation has also been a huge focus across the school and I am pleased to say that Year 4 have risen to the challenge of having the best looking books. We are just a little bit competitive! Our learning for International Day of Maths was great fun and we enjoyed making tangram patterns.



Art

Year 4 have been studying the artist Alberto Giacometti and his statues of the human form with elongated proportions. Using photos of athletes in action and jointed card models we developed our ideas about proportion and how the body moves. We created these mini sculptures from pipe cleaners and foil and they are now happily leaping in the classroom. We love how they show flow and movement. Good job everyone!



English


Year 4 really enjoyed the visit from Author Dave Shelton as part of World Book Day. We listened to how he wrote and illustrated his own books and we all had a try at creating our own comic strip characters. Firstly, we had to create a silhouette character, we then added a little more detail using colour, before finally creating 2 contrasting characters. Once we had created our characters, we started to try and write our own comic strips.

We continue to look at different genres of writing and we have enjoyed writing and performing our own persuasive adverts, critical analysis of poetry and information texts. Here are some examples and a few pictures of our comic strip characters.




History

The Vikings has been our history topic we have explored the themes of invasion, power and community. We have learned how the Vikings were driven to leave their land and become invaders. Once settled they had to maintain power and develop alliances. We finished the topic by finding out about the reasons behind and the personalities involved in the Battle of Hasting in 1066.



Geography

The water cycle is our current area of geographical investigation and we have been using the new vocabulary of evaporation, condensation, precipitation and percolation to describe the process. We even made our own mini water cycle in a bag to demonstrate the steps - just waiting for some sunshine to evaporate the water!




Music

In music we have been making our own compositions on the xylophone in small groups and learning to listen to one another to ensure that dynamics and timings are accurate.

We have continued with our topic in science 'Animals including Humans and The Digestive System'. In addition to this we have now learnt all about food chains and how we can make links between all of our four area's of learning. Our work in science this term has been really exceptional and the children have embraced their learning with much interest and curiosity. FREE SCHOOL MEALS:

Your child will get free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit but no element of Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenues & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- If you are supported under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after your employment finishes or after you start to work fewer hours per week



• Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 (£616.67 per month), as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
